# Please be considerate to our neighbours



We regularly receive calls from neighbours who are being stopped from accessing or leaving their property when parents park across

their dropped kerb. Please help us maintain a good relationship with our neighbours by parking more considerately, even if it means walking a little further.

#### **School Streets**

We have been advised by LBBD that the installation of *School Streets* car-free zones around the school will be going ahead and that work to set this up should start very soon. The use of Finnymore Road and Walfrey Gardens, as well as sections of Hatfield Road and Lullington Road, is expected to be restricted from 8:00am-9:15am, and 2.45pm-4:00pm during term time, alleviating congestion and parking problems for residents and creating a safer environment for children and parents to travel to school. Exemptions will be available for residents of these streets and for blue badge holders.

#### **Head Lice**

Adults may carry head lice without symptoms, whereas children tend to have persistent itching of the hair and scratches on the scalp and around the neck.



According to NHS guidelines, the best way to prevent the spread of headlice is to be alert to symptoms and to act on suspicion as follows:

- Detect adult lice and eggs (nits) by wet combing hair with a narrow-toothed comb. This is best done after shampooing and conditioning which loosens the lice. Most lice and nits can be removed by combing.
- If you detect visible lice in large numbers, or a few repeatedly, then visit the GP or the chemist for treatment. Treatment may be required for all the members of the household who have evidence of lice and you should all be treated at the same time. It is important to follow treatment instructions carefully or this may not work. Treatment must not be repeated on children often as it could be harmful.
- After treatment, continue to use wet combing regularly at hair washing to prevent a new infestation developing again. Lice will not survive repeated wet combing.
- Avoid head-to-head contact, as this is how lice mostly spread - they cannot fly or jump and, hence, do not spread easily.
- Avoid sharing brushes and combs, which should be cleaned at every hair wash.
- There is no need to stop your children playing with friends who have had a problem. Head lice can affect anyone and no one person is more likely to be infected than any other.
- Children can continue to attend school whilst wet combing and/or treatment is being carried out.

We realise that this is an ongoing and frustrating problem, but thank you for you for your patience and co-operation in helping with the prevention of head lice.


#### Family Hubs - £20 prize draw
